B.S.L.A. INAUGURAL CALL FOR APPLICATIONS

It has been just over two years since Philip Akin completed his tenure as the Artistic Director of Obsidian Theatre, and the subsequent launch of the Philip Akin Black Shoulders Legacy Award (BSLA). This groundbreaking award was created to safeguard the legacy of support for emerging Black Canadian theatre artists that Philip Akin catalyzed. This is the first award of its kind, solely dedicated to the success of Black Canadian theatre artists, ensuring creators are equipped with the skills to be at the top of their professional game.

The initial outpouring of support in honour of Philip was extraordinary, and we thank all of those who were a part of the initial fundraising push which began with \$150,000.

Throughout the pandemic we have continued to build the fund in preparation for this inaugural call for applications. With the funds now managed by the Shaw Festival Endowment Foundation, the award received matching funds from the Department of Canadian Heritage under the Canada Cultural Investment Fund. These matching funds, along with additional donations have brought us to approximately \$500,000. We have now raised 70% of our goal which, when reached, will self-sustain annual awards of \$5,000 each to five deserving Black theatre professionals.

Today marks the Opening Night of August Wilson's *Gem of the Ocean* directed by Philip Akin, at the Shaw Festival's Jackie Maxwell Studio Theatre. It was agreed upon by the committee that this would be the perfect date to announce the opening of applications for the inaugural award!

Applications will be accepted until October 14th and winners will be announced by the end of November 2022. Full application details are on the last page.

We welcome you to spread the word, as we continue to build on an initiative that is destined to continue changing the face of Canadian theatre.

This national award will be given to both performers and non-performers who show exceptional promise and are working towards a future in theatre, further amplifying Black voices in the Canadian theatre landscape.

Award Eligibility

- Must be a Canadian resident or citizen
- Must identify as Black
- Must be practicing in Theatre or the theatrical arts (theatre, dance or opera)
- Must be applying with a proposed opportunity in training and/or education with an eye to:
 - Deepening skill set
 - ➤ Learning new skill set
 - > Experimenting with new artistic craft

Candidates whether selected or not, are eligible to apply in a subsequent year.

Application Process

- Please submit a written submission (maximum 2 pages) or video submission (maximum 5 minutes) that outlines the proposed opportunity in training and/or education. Please tell us why you are pursuing this now, and what you hope to gain from the experience.
- Please include a résumé and/or CV with your submission.
- Please do not submit support material.
